CHRIST AT THE HELM

Joey was a student in our South Bend, Indiana, ministry as an undergraduate student. Now as a graduate student, she is serving as an apprentice with the South Bend team.

Tell us about yourself.

I am from South Bend and recently moved to Mishawaka, Indiana, with my husband last summer. I come from a loving two-parent household and have strong family values that I attribute to my Mexican heritage. My family first started attending church when I was about 10

years old. My faith really began to develop when I started attending Michiana Christian Camp (also when I was 10 years old) thanks to our

> pastor. I graduated from Washington High School in 2018 and from there went on to pursue education at

Bethel University where I graduated with a Bachelor of Arts in Psychology in the spring of 2022. Currently I am pursuing my master's in social work since the fall of 2022. I have a huge interest in socioemotional learning, mental health, and how society and humanity interact. I love visiting coffee shops, spending time in nature, and engaging the local community.

How did you get involved in campus ministry?

In 2018, I accepted a job with Michiana Christian Camp as kitchen staff—this was my first time being involved in a ministry. In 2021, I applied to be a commuter assistant at my undergraduate university (Bethel University), serving the commuter population and creating a safe, Christ-loving environment to aid in

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connection to the overall campus community.

What are some key moments in the campus ministry?

One key element of campus ministry was the community built through the commuter life department at Bethel. My team and I were able to galvanize students to attend off-campus Impact game nights, as well as other campus events. It was astounding to hear the different stories and experiences that each student brought to the

table to create such a rich and real campus ministry experience. When we leaned into diverse student populations, we were able to experience the love of Jesus within students.

Can you share anything about your walk with Jesus?

Something that has strengthened my faith has been working with students who are radically different from myself. Loving students with a Christ-centered love can feel challenging at times, especially when there are blatant differences

between us. Being able to genuinely love one another and overcome division has been rewarding. Being able to

project an empathetic lens into the lives of students has given me a heart for justice. Knowing how Jesus lived and loved has given me a purpose and challenge to live and love those around me in the same way.

Are there any other details about your story that you should mention?

I try to be as intentional as possible when interacting with students, specifically because I have no idea where they are coming from or what they are bringing to the table. I believe it is honoring to God to acknowledge injustices because of the valid reality that can largely be attributed to social problems. In order for me to be effective in my role, I value humility,

cultural awareness, and inclusion to help me love people and the world like Jesus would.
